All Boys and Girls Haven Residential youth receive around the clock therapeutic support and trauma informed care. This support is received through our trained residential staff, clinical staff, full time registered nurse, and contract psychiatrist. All youth receive weekly individual, and group therapy. Family therapy is provided when identified as appropriate by referring partners, court system and treatment team. Treatment planning is individualized based on the clinician's assessment of the child's needs. The BGH trained staff teach pro social behavior through modeling and teaching social skills during one on one and daily therapeutic milieu interactions with our youth. Our youth receive individualized independent living assessments and life skills training and when deemed appropriate by the treatment team, older youth are given access to coaching, career exposure, and access to a funnel of internships, apprenticeships, and job placements opportunities. BGH also has a barn on the property where we house our horses that assist us with the healing journey of our youth.

Describe How the Program Supports Family Connections

Whenever a youth has a family or foster family members identified as part of their renunciation BGH will engage family members in the treatment planning process. This includes regular family therapy, phone calls and visitation while a youth is participating in our program. The BGH clinical team will work with the families and Department of Community Based State social workers to assist families in overcoming any issues that may be identified as barriers that may interfere with treatment progress. BGH also works with family members by providing transportation to the home when the youth has an approved pass to leave facility. Clinical staff utilize home contact opportunities as a way to identify what is working in the therapeutic process. Clinical staff members work with families to develop aftercare plans and to secure community resources prior to reunification. BGH recognizes the importance of supporting a youth and family during a transition.

Special Interventions Available Internally

Our therapists are trained in a variety of evidenced based modalities and utilize a trauma informed approach in individualized therapeutic intervention. Interventions include Seven Challenges substance abuse services, equine-assisted therapy, expressive therapies, and JSO counseling. We offer an on-campus school, athletic and recreational activities, art activities and horticulture program. BGH has an Education Coordinator that acts as an advocate/liaison between our on-campus and community-based schools to ensure each youth has the necessary support to be successful in their educational setting. When appropriate, our Education Coordinator will work to transition a youth from the on-campus to community-based school. BGH also has an Independence Readiness Specialist that offers services for youth to develop life skills and prepare them for a career. When appropriate youth can receive specialized case management while gaining work experience.
