We have established strong partnerships with psychiatrists throughout the state to ensure those needing psychiatric services are seen promptly. All of our foster parents are trained in medication management, and the proper way to document the administration of all medication, under the supervision and support of our staff.

Describe How the Program Supports Family Connections

Our agency believes that it is important to include a child's biological family in their treatment. Kulima Care provides an orientation to the child's biological family based upon what is specified in the court order and the child's plan of service. The orientation consists of a discussion about foster care, the biological families continuing involvement with the child, agency services, and a discussion of their rights and responsibilities while the child is in foster care. Our agency also meets face-to-face with the child's biological family within the first month of placement when this is indicated by the child's service plan. The agency will continue to meet with the biological parents to help the family reach goals in order to increase preparedness for reunification.

Special Interventions Available Internally

"Kulima Care is passionate about serving the family, whether biological, foster, or adoptive, as we believe that the foundation of our work with children and youth begins in the home, therefore it is a priority to provide an abundance of support to the caregivers on the frontline parenting our clients. Our agency is committed to providing stable and safe placements for our clients by recruiting and training qualified foster and adoptive parents. The staff provides case management, clinical support, parent training, and 24-hour crisis support."
