SAFY has specialized homes that include working with the following populations: pre-IL, teen parent, large sibling groups, medically fragile, and foster to adopt. Each foster parent trained in Non-Violent Crisis Intervention through the Ukeru trainning.

Describe How the Program Supports Family Connections

SAFY encourages biological family members to participate in the youth's treatment planning. Family therapy is offered to promote healthy attachment and ease the child's transition back into the home. SAFY provides biological family with support services, including counseling, coordination of community resources, advocacy, and skill development and parenting training. Foster families are provided continuous training about partnering with biological family members to realize the goal of reunification.

Special Interventions Available Internally

SAFY provides 24/7 support and in-home therapy. SAFY therapists are licensed, Master's level staff specializing in sexual abuse, substance abuse, and disorders common to abused/neglected children, and utilize evidence based methods. Therapists are trained in TF-CBT and Seven Challenges. Foster parents receive mandatory Trauma Informed Parenting, Alcohol and Drug, Behavior Management, and Non-Violent Crisis Intervention training.
