Describe How the Program Supports Family Connections

Family connections are supported through individual and family therapy sessions, when possible, to ensure that visits (both supervised and unsupervised) are successful. Family members are invited to attend monthly treatment team meetings and are encouraged to be involved in all aspects of the client's treatment. When needed, program staff provide transportation for home visits.

Special Interventions Available Internally

Therapeutic services include individual, group and family therapy; trauma recovery support; participation in a therapeutic community; independent life skills; substance abuse counseling; and psychiatric and medical services. A variety of recreational, spiritual and cultural activities are offered within the program as well as off campus events throughout the community in which clients are encouraged to use their social skills to interact within the community setting.
