Our success is seen in the credentials and experience of our staff, the longevity of our foster parents, and the number of clients who have found forever homes (over 225 clients have been adopted in the last three years) through our foster-to-adopt emphasis across the Commonwealth.

Describe How the Program Supports Family Connections

The support of a Family Connection is something we strive for in every client's life and permanency is addressed from the minute a client is referred and admitted to our program. Our team works directly with the biological family whenever possible to include them in the progress/treatment of the child. We work with families through flexible scheduling, internet facilitated meetings/visits, family therapy, phone card assistance, supervised visitation, transportation, and other creative means of support. It is our goal to build upon the strengths of the family unit while working to provide structured supervised visitation in a "real life setting" to better prepare families for the transition of children back into their homes and lives.

Special Interventions Available Internally

Foster Care Specialists and Therapists provide home and community visits, a minimum of weekly contacts, transportation for clients, respite opportunities for families, assistant with school registration, coordinate with school personel with on going care and any behavioral or academic problems with the client, on call and emergency services, individual and group training, and supervisory visits to ensure proper assistance to families.
