Spring Meadows is a state-of-the-art, secure facility having a gym, game room, and an on-campus school under the direction of the Bullitt County Public Schools that specializes in the treatment of adolescent males with a history of sexual offenses and/or maladaptive sexual behaviors. Program clinicians are certified as Juvenile Sexual Offender Counselors. Staff are also trained in trauma-informed care and provide services such as individual, family, and group therapy, recreation therapy, substance abuse education, and psychoeducational and social skills groups. Our philosophy of care is based on a trauma recovery model that helps clients work through their issues by developing healthy, supportive, and trusting relationships with our mentoring staff. Through this model we address underlying attachment issues and emphasize restoration of relationships so that clients can achieve growth and success. Sunrise's continuum of care provides the opportunity for youth to step down to less restrictive placement options.

Describe How the Program Supports Family Connections

Clients with family connections are encouraged to call or write their families regularly. Family connections are also supported through individual and family therapy sessions. Family members are invited to attend monthly treatment team meetings and are encouraged to be involved in all aspects of the client's treatment. When there is program availability, staff provide transportation for home visits.

Special Interventions Available Internally

The school utilizes individual learning though a computerized program edgenuity and packets to help restore clients to expected grade levels as well as provides opportunities for traditional classroom learning. In addition to the individual and group therapeutic services, Spring Meadows offers psycho-educational groups: Anger Management Group provides clients with methods for identifying anger triggers, responses, and constructive choices in expressing anger. Independent Life Skills Group for clients over age 16 provides CPR and First Aid certification and other life skills. Parenting Group helps clients attain skills in parenting and relationship building. Clients also participate in learning-based activities such as, sports, service projects, equine therapy and optional cultural, recreational, spiritual opportunities.
