Psychiatric Services

Upon admission to the Therapeutic Foster Care program, youth are assessed immediately through an initial risk assessment, initial intake assessment and then a more comprehensive assessment within the first 30 days. If a youth enters the program under a physician's supervision and established medications, Kentucky MENTOR will make every effort to maintain the youth's established physician and coordinate appointments. During the assessment, if there is concern or question that warrants further evaluation by a psychiatrist, Kentucky MENTOR will assist family in accessing a community provider for follow-up. Kentucky MENTOR is in the process of expanding our clinical team and outside of our current Treatment Director, we are adding licensed, clinical therapists with established experience in EBPs to actively involve all members of our treatment team under the Mentor Family Vistas model.

Describe How the Program Supports Family Connections

At The MENTOR Network, we believe that children belong at home with their family of origin whenever possible. Our goal is to help families overcome the challenges they face and stay together. Our mentors and staff welcome the opportunity to involve biological family members in the care of their child in hopes of them returning to their biological home as soon as possible. Kentucky MENTOR assists with this process through parent visitation, reunification visits, involvement in treatment planning, and transportation assistance. We treat the entire family—not just the child. We work with the child, parents, siblings and members of the extended family who are involved in the child's circle of support. By helping the entire family make positive changes, we are able to produce meaningful, lasting outcomes.

Special Interventions Available Internally

The Network's Family Vistas® model emphasizes the healing effects of family relationships. Our specially trained staff conduct comprehensive clinical assessments to identify a child's strengths and create personalized treatment plans. With the support of their Mentors, children learn to build coping skills to help them overcome challenges, such as trauma, anxiety, depression, substance abuse and problems in school. Our dedicated treatment teams work with our Mentors and the family of origin, when appropriate, to help each child reach the destination of their choosing—whether it's reunification with their biological family, adoption or independent living.
