PCC TRACKING MOVE REASONS

(Revised 5/22/2025)

<u>Caretaker Incapacity</u> (Foster Care programs only, not for use with Residential Treatment or Independent Living programs)

- <u>22 Caretaker physical illness/emotional problem/incapacity</u> Move is due to a change in a caretaker's physical or emotional health, making continued placement unsuitable. (*Disruption*)
- <u>24 Caretaker death</u> Move is due to the death of a caretaker. (*Disruption*)
- 25 Caretaker change in life situation Move is due to a change in life circumstance for a caretaker that is not specified in another "caretaker incapacity" reason and makes continued placement unsuitable. For example, a change in employment or a change in the health of a caretaker's relative requires the caretaker to care for the relative and end the placement. (Disruption)

<u>Caretaker Failure</u> (Foster Care programs only, not for use with Residential Treatment or Independent Living programs)

- <u>26 Caretaker non-compliance with requirements</u> Move is due to a caretaker not complying with agency (public or private) policy or licensing regulations. (*Disruption*)
- <u>29 Caretaker relinquishment (rejects child)</u> Move is due to a caretaker surrendering the child for reasons that are not due to the child's behavioral health needs, and the caretaker's whereabouts are known. (*Disruption*)
- 30 Caretaker leaves public or private agency: Child moves The child is moved because a caretaker leaves the agency (public or private) or discontinues fostering. For example, when a caretaker chooses to work for a different agency AND the child moves to a different home. There are no other caretaker reasons for the move. (Disruption)
- 31 Caretaker leaves public or private agency: Child does not move The caretaker leaves the agency (public or private), and a payment change is needed, but the child is not moved. For example, when a caretaker transitions their home to a different agency, AND the child does not move to a different home. There are no other caretaker reasons for the move. (Neutral)

<u>Caretaker Investigation</u> (Foster Care programs only, not for use with Residential Treatment or Independent Living programs)

- <u>33 CPS/APS investigation</u> Move is due to the initiation of a CPS or APS investigation on either a caretaker or a member of the caretaker's household. (*Disruption*)
- <u>34 Criminal investigation</u> Move is due to the initiation of a criminal investigation on either a caretaker or a member of the caretaker's household. (*Disruption*)

Child Behavioral Difficulties

- <u>35 Property destruction</u> Move is primarily due to the child's destruction of property. (*Disruption*)
- <u>36 Aggressive to peers</u> Move is primarily due to the child's physically aggressive behavior toward peers. (*Disruption*)
- <u>37 Aggressive to caregivers</u> Move is primarily due to the child's physically aggressive behavior toward caregivers. (*Disruption*)
- <u>38 Problematic sexual behavior</u> Move is primarily due to a child's problematic sexual behavior. (*Disruption*)
- <u>39 Sexual aggression</u> Move is primarily due to the child's sexually aggressive behavior that is forceful or coercive in nature (includes targeting vulnerable individuals). (*Disruption*)
- <u>40 Elopement behavior</u> Move is primarily due to the child's elopement behavior. (*Disruption*)
- <u>41 Homicidal ideation/behavior</u> Move is primarily due to the child's homicidal ideation/behavior. (*Disruption*)
- <u>42 Suicidal ideation/behavior</u> Move is primarily due to the child's suicidal ideation/behavior. (*Disruption*)
- <u>43 Non-suicidal self-injurious behavior</u> Move is primarily due to the child's non-suicidal, self-injurious behavior. (*Disruption*)
- <u>44 Substance misuse</u> Move is due primarily to substance misuse by the child. (*Disruption*)
- <u>45 Defiant oppositional behavior</u> Move is primarily due to the child's defiant/oppositional behavior. (*Disruption*)
- <u>46 Other behavioral/emotional need that cannot be met by the caregiver</u> Move is due primarily to some other behavioral or emotional problem by the child. (*Disruption*)
- <u>69 Treatment needs cannot be met by the provider</u> The program is not able to meet the behavioral health needs of the youth who requires increased intensity of services or a specific issue that needs to be addressed. Any kind of health care (*Disruption*)

Child Progress Toward Permanency

- <u>47 Adoptive or pre-adoptive placement</u> Move is due to the child being placed in a formalized adoptive or pre-adoptive home. (*Progress*)
- 48 Placement with siblings or child Move is due to the child being placed with his/her siblings or child. (*Progress*)
- <u>49 Placement closer to home</u> Move is due to the child being placed closer to home. (*Progress*)
- <u>51 Placement with relatives</u> Move is due to the child being placed with a relative or in kinship care. (*Progress*)
- <u>52 Educational/Vocational placement</u> Move is due to the child being placed in an educational or vocational setting (e.g., college, Job Corps). (*Progress*)
- <u>53 Placement with teen/youth parent in care</u> Move is due to the infant child being placed with his/her teenage, committed parent. (*Progress*)

- <u>54 Needs less restrictive care</u> Move is due to the child making progress, but the reason is not due to one of the other "child progress toward permanency" reasons. For example, a child moving from a residential placement to a foster care placement. (*Progress*)
- <u>55 Trial home visit</u> Child is placed with parent/guardian with the intent that the child will not return to the OOHC placement. (*Progress*)
- <u>56 Released from DCBS custody</u> Child is exiting DCBS care/custody. (*Progress*)
- <u>68 Placed with fictive kin</u> Move is due to the child being placed with fictive kin. (*Progress*)

Agency or System Move Reason

- <u>57 Agency non-compliance with contract or licensing</u> Move is due to the program/home being noncompliant with contract or licensing and may or may not result in program closure. For example, a program could exhibit systemic problems warranting either closure and/or moving all children. (*Disruption*)
- <u>58 Provider voluntarily closes program/service</u> Move is due to the discontinuance of services by the provider. For example, when an agency closes a unit (does not apply to a single foster home). (*Disruption*)
- <u>60 Move from short-term temporary placement Move is made from an intentional temporary placement (e.g., an emergency shelter, crisis stabilization unit, detention, etc.) to a more stable placement. (Neutral)</u>
- 61 Court orders placement change Move is due to court order. (Neutral)
- 62 DCBS worker dissatisfaction with service delivery Move is due to the legal guardian's dissatisfaction with the delivery of services that does not rise to the level of "Agency non-compliance with contract or licensing". For example, when group therapy has been recommended but not provided. (*Disruption*)
- <u>65 Move between independent living locations</u> Child moves from one independent living location to another independent living location within the parent agency. (*Neutral*)
- <u>66 Administrative change within parent agency: Child does not move</u> Foster family changes affiliation from one licensed program to another within the same licensed agency, and the child does not move. (*Neutral*)
- <u>67 Youth does not meet program criteria</u> Move is due to when a private agency discovers information about the child, which would have caused the private agency to not admit the child had the information been known prior to admission. (*Disruption*)

<u>Unplanned Move Reason</u>

- 70 Child death Child is discharged abruptly and without notice due to the child passing away. (Disruption)
- <u>71 Move to detention</u> Placement in detention is always an unplanned discharge. (Disruption)
- <u>72 Move to hospitalization</u> Child is discharged abruptly and without notice due to hospitalization. (Disruption)

- <u>73 Move to missing from care</u> Child is discharged abruptly and without notice due to elopement behavior. (Disruption)
- 74 Released from DCBS custody (unplanned) Child is released from commitment in an unplanned fashion, such as when the court orders the release. (Neutral)
- <u>75 Trial home visit (unplanned)</u> Trial Home Visit is unplanned by the program, as in the case of a court order. (Neutral)
